

What a great and defining year 2014 was for Life in Abundance. It not only marked our most significant millstone on this cause, but it definitely brought LIA to a very beautiful peak. If I could define 2014 in a phrase, it was the year “Life in Abundance prevailed”.

Since 2009, we had been on a cause to establish a training center that would host our training function and also the LIA headquarters. This culminated in purchasing the land, setting a building committee, working on drawings, getting the necessary permits, raising funds, contracting and at last, at the start of 2014, we broke ground to implement the buildings. By God’s grace, the buildings came up and each month of 2014 saw that advance to its completion. Despite the challenges and threats, we prevailed and came through, with great joy. God is splendid in faithfulness.

Another highlight was the maturing of our work in Jamaica. When we initiated this work, a missionary couple from Kenya was charged to pioneer the work for Life in Abundance, until such a time that the model could be established and local leaders can be empowered to take over the work. Dependency caused by the way of ministry was prevalent and a new way of missions was an uphill task. By God’s grace, we prevailed. We successfully transitioned the leadership of LIA Jamaica to Jamaicans and that work is growing rapidly with great impact across the island.

In response to requests to disciple transformational development for our USA partner churches, in 2014, a Regional Program Director position for the USA and the Caribbean was established. Training for church groups both in the USA and in our training center in Jamaica accelerated. Transformational development is being embraced in ways we never imagined.

For the second time, LIA hosted the Global Missions Health Conference – Africa, in Nairobi. This time round, we added a third day with a medical students’ emphasis. The growing global representation with participants from Europe, the USA and Africa continues to expand. We look forward to our 2015 conference for more experience sharing, networking and inspiration.

Life in Abundance has had partners in Europe for several years now. This last year, a strategy to establish LIA Europe was set in motion which saw LIA welcomed a new Europe representative on our International board. This strategic step will establish fundraising systems in Europe, with bases in Switzerland and the UK.

The greatest impact in 2014 came from our programs. Transformation indicators were greatly encouraging. God’s glory was declared in the deeds. We are excited for what God will do in 2015 as we begin our work in the Lakes Region, specifically in Rwanda and the Congo. It’s also the year that we will see increased trainings at our newly build LIA Center in Nairobi.

LIA'S APPROACH TO TRANSFORMATIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Poverty takes away life. Our deep conviction is that poverty prevents people from fully realizing their God-given worth, freedom and potential. LIA exists to restore life to the most vulnerable people in the world's most difficult places.

In order to do so, we must **TRANSFORM. TOGETHER.**

We must join together to bring about healthy, lasting change in hurting communities across the world. God calls us to take part in His transforming work and promises that we, too, will be transformed in the process.

At LIA, we believe the local church is the catalyst to this transforming work. We take an integrated approach to mobilizing the local church to restore health, renew hope and inspire lasting transformation for its most vulnerable families. Our transformational development model cultivates local leadership through the Church and requires the participation and ownership from the community itself.

Specifically, we train, equip and walk with local churches throughout Africa and the Caribbean to:

EMPOWER the POOR with ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITIES

Earning capacity and savings are the basis for material poverty alleviation. Dignity and self-worth are made complete providing for one's family. LIA focuses on economic empowerment opportunities that promote self-sufficiency and innovation to create value in a given economy.

PROMOTE Health and Prevent Disease

Health is the basis for life. Each and every community that LIA serves has a specific emphasis on health promotion and disease prevention. This is carried out in a community-identified manner that builds upon existing assets, capacity and the established health network (when possible).

EQUIP The vulnerable to BREAK THE CYCLE

Community mobilization is the basis for breaking the cycle. In order for them to lift themselves out of restriction poverty, they must be equipped to do so. LIA walks alongside communities as they identify the structural evil that perpetuates their circumstances. LIA encourages its local church partners to fully utilize their unique role in the community by advocating for its most vulnerable members.

EDUCATE the Marginalized

Education is the basis for development. All LIA initiatives include community-wide seminars and targeted educational interventions, depending upon the identified needs, assets and capacity within a community. Specific attention is always given to developing the practical theology of our community church partners.

LIA'S TRANSFORMATIONAL DEVELOPMENT MODEL

LIA partners with the local church to build its capacity to meet needs of its community for the long-term. When no formal church exists, LIA helps build the capacity of local believers.

The most important aspect in transformational development is cultivating local leadership through training, equipping and working with them as they meet their community's needs.

Once the program is established and local leadership capacity is developed, LIA begins to decrease involvement, so the community may take complete ownership.



Local leadership works with LIA to identify and implement integrated, long-term solutions that address the root causes of poverty, both physically and spiritually. LIA then helps the community apply its training with the first integrated initiative, an orphans and vulnerable children program.



Although the realities of poverty might look different in every community, what remains constant is that the most vulnerable people in these communities are often the children.

We've learned that when we address the needs of the most vulnerable first, the orphaned and vulnerable children, and their families, we have seen the greatest level of impact and change among the community.

By implementing an orphaned and vulnerable children (OVC) program as the first intervention in communities, we can use that program to demonstrate and lay the foundation for transformational development in the community. This is one way that we equip the local church to then implement additional, supplement programs to address the needs of the greater community.

In 2014, LIA, in partnership with 161 partner churches, helped implement OVC programs in seven countries, benefitting nearly 5,959 OVC and their families/caregivers.

Highlights from 2014

As we continue to faithfully and humbly serve our Lord in the work that he has called us to, we are constantly amazed at the blessings and progress he grants across the 10 countries where LIA serves. The pages that follow highlight significant ministry activities from 2014 in both established and emerging countries for LIA:



ECONOMIC EMPOWERMENT HIGHLIGHTS

Last year, 1,401 people received business and skills training to empower them to provide for their families moving forward and 342 individuals received micro-loans and at the end of the year 399 people were operating their own businesses (income generation activities).

In Ethiopia, beneficiary families have formed a cooperative that is formally registered and recognized by the local government. The cooperative, managed by selected beneficiary volunteers, is responsible to disburse loan and repayment.



Community Health Highlights

20,833 people served through integrated, church-led community health programs in 2014.

In 2014, 139 households have abandoned the practice of open field defecation and started using ventilated Improved Pit Latrines (VIPL) that have been constructed by LIA's slum development project in one of the slums of Addis Ababa, Ethiopia.

1,771 people have had access to clean and safe water supply.



Social Engagement Highlights

In 2014, LIA helped implement orphans and vulnerable children programs in seven countries, benefitting nearly 5,995 OVC and their families/caregivers.



Education Highlights

6,591 children and youth received education services in varying ways through LIA programs with its local church partners.

386 children have been enrolled and benefitted from church-based childhood development (ECD) programs in Egypt and Djibouti. The children have been supported with supplementary feeding, received medical care and others.

Overall, 630 students enrolled in LIA-initiated primary school (1st-5th grade) in Rumbek, South Sudan. The number is a 15% increase from the previous year, and 76 % increase since the school began in 2011. A year-to-year increase has been reported since the start of the school.

1,872 children have been provided a meal while in school and 586 people have benefitted from the literacy education program, enabling them to read and write.

RESULTS

In 2014, LIA partnered with more than 161 churches to serve more than 64,318 people directly. Through this service, more than 24,017 people were evangelized, 1,364 known to receive Christ and 1,825 believers were disciplined – some in extremely unsafe communities for Christ's followers.

Our training center in Jamaica was used to equip local church leadership from around the world and steps were taken to begin replicating LIA's model of community transformation in local communities in the US.

LIA now has more than 183 staff serving across 10 nations in Africa, the Caribbean and the US. Together, the LIA team plans to engage more than 226 churches during the next strategic period (2014-2016) to transform their communities.

Every day, our local church partners are restoring health, renewing hope and inspiring lasting transformation for the world's most vulnerable children and families. "That all may have Life In Abundance..." (John 10:10b)

ETHIOPIA

Arada is one of the 10 sub cities of Addis Ababa, the capital of Ethiopia. As of 2011, it is home to over 225,999 people. Arada is also known as the center of the old and the new generation artistic, social and urban life style.

Like other slums in the Capital, Life in Arada is so pathetic and unbearable. Given the tough economic conditions, including rampant inflation, the majority have unmet needs like food, clothing, latrine, shelter, and basic health care. One can see several street children on the streets of Arada with ragged and dirty clothes, hungry and looking malnourished. At night, it is easy to note them huddled along street corners, in doorways, or in any dry and secluded corner. People mostly regard them as nuisance, if not as dangerous mini-criminals.

In 2012, LIA began a three-year street children project in Arada. The project is named after the city. Since its inception, the project has benefitted 350 vulnerable children and families under its two major program components: preventing at-risk children from ending up on the streets and rehabilitating those children who are already there. In the area of prevention, the project has been working with 150 at-risk children and their families.

Tafese used-to be a street child in Arada, Ethiopiin

Tafese is the definition of an aggressive entrepreneur, but with his soft face and a very composed demeanor you almost wouldn't know it. In just two years after joining the ARADA project Tafese has opened a bakery, hired a couple of employees and is bringing in a consistent profit daily.

Tafese was born in southern Ethiopia in the Oromia region. After a falling out with his family he ran away from home staying with family and friends until finally making his way to Addis Ababa. After being unable to find a job or anyone to take him in he made a life for himself on the streets.

In 2012 Tafese joined the ARADA project and took up a technical training course in baking injera – Ethiopian traditional bread. Wanting to apply himself he asked the program to give him a loan to buy the necessary machines and help him find a kitchen to cook in.

Within the year he had hired two casual workers and started making a profit of close to \$20 a day. ARADA still supports him giving him a rent free space to work and paying 25% of this electricity bill. Having just finished 9th grade, Tafese still found time to not only go to school but also take up a training course in plumbing and is now a certified plumber.

LIA TRAINING CENTER

Have you ever sought something you knew should exist; but were told it did not and then found it?

The church was always more than just God's instrument for salvation. Jesus said that the Kingdom of God is at hand. I see the Kingdom being the Holy Spirit indwelling and working through the believer together with other believers (the church) in connection with the family and civil government to bring an earthly reflection of the heavenly Kingdom. Even from the earliest days the local church(es) created other structures to aid it in its work. Today we use the name parachurch as a catchall for these structures. But the local church is the most effective witness and agent of transformation.

The Industrial Age saw a significant growth in parachurch ministries when the church took seriously the commands of taking the Gospel to the utter most parts of the world. As the Industrial Age ended we have seen technology change the way in which we perceive the world and operate in it. The Telegraph (UK) estimates by this time next year 2 billion people will own smart phones. The world is smaller and the access to information ubiquitous.

A trend that I have seen over the last decade is the movement of power back to the local

church. Ministries that aid the church in doing its work will have a great future and ministries that do the work of the church will decline. We were told development was different because of the need for large agencies, government grants, and specialized expertise. Yet that violated my own concepts of the church and the Kingdom.

I remember the first time I met Florence Muindi, MD and the excitement I felt as she unfurled the story of Life in Abundance. The ministry was multifaceted including health, economic, education and social engagement. The local church was the owner and provider of the services which gave it sustainability and gave programs cultural flavor and immediate acceptance. These issues were points of failure in so many Western programs. But the strength of LIA was that it would not go into a village or town or country unless the different expressions of the Body of Christ came together to issue the invitation. I have seen LIA work in some of the poorest areas of Africa. The local pastors showed me their programs and the recipients of service saw the local Body of Christ as the providers and were drawn to the church by its love and then to Christ. This was what I had been seeking. It works.

Financial Assessment of 2014

After joining the LIA team and completing my second year with LIA, I am so grateful for the opportunity to write this letter. It is a time to celebrate what our Lord has done through the generosity of our partners and the careful stewardship of resources among our family.

LIA is an accredited member in good standing with the Evangelical Council for Financial Accountability (ECFA) and adheres strictly to its Seven Standards for LIA governance, financial transparency, integrity in fundraising and proper use of ministry resources. The LIA team seeks to give their very best in every aspect of the ministry. The poor and the vulnerable we serve deserve nothing less. And it is incumbent on us to meet or exceed any standards the wisdom of men may establish—this is an essential part of our testimony.

Return on Investment

Earlier this year, I was asked by a funding organization how I would describe our “return on investment” (ROI) as a ministry. For all the ministries they consider giving to, they would attempt to assign a dollar amount that fit their particular mission. If it was an evangelistic association, for instance, they would ask how much a “salvation would cost”, for instance. If the ministry was scripture distribution, they would divide the total

budget by the number of Bibles given away. My immediate response was, “That’s not an answerable question.” I went on to describe how, if a community is truly transformed and that transformation was sustained, that cannot be measured in a mathematical equation. I stated, “You can’t divide our budget by infinity.”

I wasn’t being a wise guy. I was simply acknowledging how God uses the model He has entrusted to LIA. In January I had the opportunity to visit Mekuene outside Nairobi Kenya. LIA phased out nearly three years ago. However, the community that started in a very humble state, has continued to grow leaps and bounds since we “phased out.” The church has distributed water storage tanks as a hedge against drought in strategic places. They have also self-funded grain storage buildings and containers to gather and safely store grains from within their cooperative. Through their maturing group of TOTs, their zeal has compelled them to reach out to adjacent communities 10 and 15 kilometers away to envision them.

This summer, LIA has also launched a research project that uses a distinct method of gauging community transformation...but we already know what God does when He comes into our midst. Remarkable. Miraculous.

Trends showing careful Stewardship

In 2014, we experienced God's blessing in increased income. Pledge receivables increased 19% over 2013, and contributions increased by 38%. Bless the Lord for our faithful, generous partners!

I want to invite you to "peak under the hood" and pray about two specific things where are trying to grow. Here are two things you can pray for that would allow us to pursue our mission with greater effectiveness:

Please pray for increased undesignated gifts

- Most income arrives in the form of gifts designated to specific projects. Increasing general income has been a goal in every organization I have served and every ministry I have consulted. In this area, LIA has a lot of company. Pray that our undesignated gifts—gifts simply offered to fulfill the vision of LIA—would increase. This would have two immediate effects:
 - It would help us fund the "entire" budget.
 - Increased nimbleness, would allow us to respond more readily to new, emergent opportunities.

Please pray for an increase in regular monthly contributions

- These gifts are so helpful in helping a ministry "iron out" the predictable seasonal fluctuations in giving.

What is on the Horizon?

As I write this, Dr. Florence has just returned from the trip to "open Rwanda." More information will be forthcoming. Celebrate with me as God opens new areas where we can be used to serve the vulnerable, bringing hope and transformation that centers on God and His church.

Also, please celebrate with me the opening of the new Training Center in Karen, Nairobi, Kenya. Our mission is two-fold. With God's blessing, this Center will grow to become an effective place of learning... and women and men will emerge from it better equipped to serve.

Thank you.

Those two words sound so simple. However, I have the joy of representing the thousands of beneficiaries we have served and those who have yet to hear. Thank you, and may God fill you with appropriate satisfaction in the roles you have fulfilled in advancing the kingdom.




